Go to northshoreaudubon.org and check out our updated website created by Tom Natale. Joan Parry's stunning photos predominate. There are still some places that need work but it's up and running. If you have suggestions or complaints about the website contact me at nsaudubonsociety@gmail.com.

One of my contributions is the Bird-Friendly Habitat link. NSAS received a grant from AudubonNY to start a backyard certification program of birdfriendly habitats. The first link describes the rational for using native plants. The second link is other ways you can help in your yard to establish a bird-friendly habitat, and then the certification link explains the process that involves a competent person coming to your yard to check it out. If you have the knowledge and are interested in evaluating yards, please contact me. The experience of having someone come to your yard should be educational. There are also many resources listed to help people plan any changes to their yards to help birds. If your yard passes the certification process you get a lovely small sign that says: "Certified Bird-friendly Habitat; This property uses native plants, removes invasive plants, and provides other essential elements for birds to thrive."

To complement this initiative, an expert speaker on native plants, Vincent Simeone, will speak at the March 28th meeting at Manhasset Library. Vincent Simeone is the director of Planting Fields Arboretum and NY State Historical Park and an expert horticulturalist. He is also an inspired speaker. His main emphasis is that native plants can be just as beautiful as exotic ones and he will showcase these native plants. The rational for why you should use native plants is explained on the website and will not be a focus of this speaker.

Other parts of the NSAS website include the home page, which lists the meetings and bird walks. The Ways to Help link lists the many ways members can volunteer. Expert birders can do shore-


bird surveys during migration. Less than expert birders can still participate in citizen science doing Cornell's Project Feederwatch and the Great Backyard Bird Count each February and the big sit October 7 and 8. Using ebird is also mentioned. There are opportunities to help educate children and the public and to maintain native plant gardens and preserves by weeding.

Please read the conservation page to learn about efforts to protect water and bird habitats and to educate the public about climate change. There are suggestions how a person can live a life that helps conservation efforts. Please join Audubon Action Alerts so you can contact your government representatives if you want your opinion heard on these issues. The FAQ page has useful information such as what to do with baby birds and who to contact in similar situations.

Included from the original website is the history of NSAS and the walk locations page as well as board members' contact information. To join NSAS there is the form to fill out and mail with a check or hand in to a board member during the monthly meetings. People who join National Audubon are already members.

The Northern Nassau 2016 Christmas Count was December 17th and despite the awful weather (snow, sleet and rain) we bagged 100 species and just shy of 25,000 individuals (on the low side without the giant rafts of Scaup). Many species found on previous counts were missing due to the hard cold snap and frozen ponds. But a number of goodies finally brought us up to 100. Rareties for the day were; Com Yellowthroat (possibly suicidal), Com Raven-they have set up shop in the Roslyn Port Washington area and are likely breeding (I had them in my yard in Port this summer), Red-neck Grebe (upper Hempstead Harbor), Pine Warbler, Vesper Sparrow, Bald Eagle-which have been recolonizing LI (there were 4 spotted in different areas and there are about 5 known nesting sites on the island), Am Pippet, Merlin, Red-headed Woodpecker, a late lingering Osprey, and a Yellow Breasted Chat-initially misidentified as a Com Yellowthroat until the photos were examined. And for the Count week; Red-shouldered hawk, Lesser Yellowlegs, Peregrine Falcon, Snow Goose and Ross' Goose.






