From the President Peggy Maslow

On an early September trip to visit relatives in Denver I learned that one yard can make a difference in helping birds. Although there were some yards with flowers in the suburban Littleton neighborhood where I walked for an hour, only one yard was teeming with hummingbirds. When I came to this yard, across from a reservoir and closer to the foothills after taking a ten minute walk from my relatives' home, I found at least ten or more hummingbirds each morning.

I spoke to the owner, Tina Jones, who explained that in the spring hummingbirds migrate up the West coast in California when there are flowers blooming and in the late summer and fall hummingbirds migrate south through the Rockies where there are usually flowers blooming then. However, this year with the drought, more hummingbirds have descended to the suburbs. Tina Jones has seen hundreds of hummingbirds this fall, rufous, calliope, broad-tail, and black-chin. Even ruby-throated hummingbirds visit once each the fall. The anna hummingbird that visited her yard one fall was a Colorado record. It stayed for 3 months during the snow, surviving on a special food blend of nector/insect solution.

For many years Tina has prepared her yard for hummingbird visits. Tina uses annuals and pe-She plants annuals in over 10 raised rennials. beds made of cut barrels. She finds that this eliminates the need to weed. (Find the color photo of the annuals and perennials on NSAS webpage.) The hummingbirds crowd around the red and purple annuals, native to Mexico where the hummingbirds will eventually live in the winter. Tina says that the birds recognize these flowers, which all have the deep shape into which hummingbirds love to stick their bills. The native perennials include some we use in the East such as cardinal flower, bee balm and trumpet vine. Also, native purple coneflower attracts insects which the hummingbirds also need to eat. Most of her perennials come from the southwest, and are familiar to the birds.

Tina instructs people to put their sugar water hummingbird feeders in the shade. She uses sugar and distilled water which she changes every two days. Her husband claims the birds prefer the taste of distilled water to the usual boiled water. Insects, midges, which are just as important to the diet of the hummingbirds, swarm over the yard. Tina jokes that she bought the house years ago because of the midges. She explains hummingbirds love to eat insects. "The protein helps them migrate," she said.

Trees and shrubs are also important in a yard for shelter and shade. Tina advises those people interested in helping hummingbirds in their yard not to have the Chinese praying mantis which can kill hummingbirds. Native praying mantis are smaller and cause less harm.

Tina Jones grew up in Connecticut on a property where ruby-throated hummingbirds nested so she is very familiar with our eastern hummingbird. A known expert on hummingbirds she is quoted in a book, Hummingbird Gardens, and she teaches programs on establishing bird-friendly habitats especially for hummingbirds. She suggests contacting the National Wildflower Research Center in Austin, Texas, for a list of nurseries that carry native plants. When you go to plant nurseries she recommends always checking roots of the plants you buy after asking permission first. You don't want root-bound plants and those with not enough roots.

Besides helping hummingbirds Tina is motivated because she loves watching them. "Hummers are not timid or shy. They are gutsy and aggressive," she said. For those who want to watch a DVD, look for Hummingbirds of North American. My Denver relative described Tina's garden as magical.

Note: List of annuals I will plant next spring to attract hummingbirds in my New York yard; Lantana - new gold (Lantana camara,) Salvia-Saucy red Salvia. Additionally, Petunias, Flowering Tobacco, Cleome, Cardinal Vine – pretty much any tubular flower in red, magenta or orange, will attract hummer. My reference was a book by Vincent Simeone, New York and New Jersey, Getting Started Garden Guide.

North Shore Audubon has lost another long time member. Herb Roth, a great conservationist and birding mentor to many, passed away in October.

Herb was a long-time NSAS and QCBC member, volunteering for North Shore for many years, and serving as President, newsletter editor and webmaster. Herb led numerous bird trips both local and away for both North Shore and Queens County bird club. Rick Kedenburg recalls that Herb was not only a great birder but a true "hands on environmental activist".

As the representative of North Shore Audubon, working along with Huntington Audubon, Herb was instrumental in providing leadership, financial support and management for Theodore Roosevelt Sanctuary in Oyster Bay after National Audubon had abandoned support of the sanctuary. Without the hands on work of Herb Roth, the environmental education for schools, and much else the TR Sanctuary has done, would not exist. Many years latter, National returned to managing the Sanctuary and made it an Audubon Center.
