

Native plants becoming more popular

Barbara Garriel's native plant garden attracted the attention of two new neighbors who moved to Bayville last January. As they were walking their dog they stopped to admire the phlox and hibiscus, two of many native plants in Barbara's yard. Barbara came out to talk to them and got to know them. The man is a bee-keeper and very interested in pollinator plants. Barbara directed the pair to the Bayville Village native plant garden that had NSAS brochures in the holder. If we all had native plants that stimulated others in our neighborhoods to plant the same, this would help our efforts to create bird-friendly habitats using native plants. Contact me if you have any questions about plant choice.

For our Spring native plant sale, Veronica, the Director of Garvies Point Museum and Preserve, where the sale is held, posted on the Facebook Long Island Native Plants group whic gave us a large portion of our sales. I joined LINP and found a very knowledgeable administrator, Anthony Marinello, who is also the owner of Dropseed Native Landscapes. I enjoy going on this group as much as any birding group. Today I leaned from Anthony that there is a native lily, Lillium Philadelphicum. Other participants bring up interesting problems or show their gardens. I recommend this group to all the gardeners who want to grow native plants. It already has 2928 members! I am now more hopeful that native plants will become popular.

NSAS to lead Bird Walks for the Public

Both Sands Point Preserve and Planting Fields Arboretum personnel have asked NSAS to lead bird walks for them. The Planting Fields Community Engagement Coordinator explained they are planning a special series of events to highlight birds. She writes, "In September, we will be opening a new exhibition in our bird sanctuary called The Great Bird Blind Debate. The exhibition, by artists Mark Dion and David Brooks will inaugurate our new Catalyst commission program at Planting Fields. The installations will frame Dion's and Brooks' dueling views on birding as an activity and birders as a distinct and growing community. The bird sanctuary was selected for the installations based on the artists' mutual interest in

ornithology and new perspectives that emerged out of our recently completed Cultural Landscape Report highlighting the environmental impact of the landscape of Planting Fields." For those of you who haven't been to the bird garden there that NSAS volunteers planted several years ago, you will now see a new bird blind. Two walks are scheduled on Saturdays at 9 am, September 12 and October 3. An owl walk is scheduled for 6 pm on October 10. Anyone interested in volunteering to lead please contact me. We need several leaders so groups are small because of the Covid virus.

Sands Point Preserve public walks are September 13, Sunday and October 10, Saturday, at 8 am for an hour and a half. We have two leaders for the first one but could use more volunteers so that the groups stay small. Because NSAS volunteered to do the walks, Sands Point Preserve gave NSAS bird walk access free to our members in September. Hopefully these public walks will lead to new members or at least more people who treasure and appreciate birds.

Monarch Butterfly Enabler

I am not sure what to call Tanya Clusener, so I am calling her a Monarch butterfly enabler. But that is not totally accurate. She collects Monarch Butterfly eggs from milkweeds all over Nassau County. She has come two times to my house and once to my neighbor's house and multiple times to the native plant garden I maintain at the Science Museum of Long Island. She uses scissors to cut off the part of the leaf that has the tiny white egg which is usually on the underside of the leaf. She also finds caterpillars of all sizes, some as small as a quarter inch piece of thread.

She does this to increase the population since eggs

and caterpilars suffer high mortality in nature.

The eggs go in one container and when the caterpillars emerge she puts them in another with milkweed leaves to eat. When the caterpillars get quite large and are ready to make a chrysalis they go in another area where they attach themselves to the top and hang there until they transform, which is amazing to watch. Their skin splits and eventually sloughs off as the chrysalis forms. They hang for over a week until they emerge as a butterfly but they still need to "pump" themselves up. Soon Tanya places the emerged butterfly in a mesh container after she puts a tiny sticker to identify them if caught. Tanya records each sticker number and date in a database.

Tanya has been releasing up to 50 Monarchs every few days for the past weeks in August.

Some of the special precautions she needs to take are to clean everything regularly because there are many organisms that can endanger the caterpillars. Tanya also prioritizes education of the public and others who want to emulate what she does. She says that at least 10 people "raise" Monarchs, following her example but on a much smaller scale.

I am hoping NSAS can schedule Tanya to do a zoom presentation and CBS news is also interested so she may be on television. She devotes hours every day for months to this very impressive endeavor. Over 1500 Monarchs have grown to adult butterflies and been released by Tanya.

Tanya sent this fascinating look into the difficulties and details of raising monarchs;


There is a parasitic organism called OE. It's an especially big problem when butterflies are raised together with caterpillars because when they defecate over the caterpillars it gets onto their food/the milkweed leaves. The wings of the butterfly can also have OE (which is easily visible under a microscope) and so another reason not to have the two growth period types together is because when they flap their wings the dander, if infected w OE, can also contaminate the bodies and food supply of the caterpillars. This is less of an issue in the wild because everything is spread out and there is less chance for the parasite to be compounded in the caterpillars. OE can be found on the leaves of the milkweed in nature and is a reason I wash the leaves at the end of the season before feeding the caterpillars.

In Florida there is a serious problem because the OE doesn't die in winter the way it would here and so it accumulates. Especially on the asclepia curasivica (my fave) which is the soft perennial version of milkweed... so pretty! But that population of monarchs doesn't migrate.. they stay year-round so it's less of an issue.

The OE infested butterfly is often deformed with crumpled wings that never properly unfurl. I experienced it about 5 times the first time I raised monarchs but never since I know how to prevent it. Online monarch FB groups show people not knowing what they're doing and making a mess and having a constant string of infected butterflies. It's sad. It's recommended to euthanize those butterflies in a bag in the freezer. They just go to sleep and never wake up but at least the disease doesn't spread. Then its recommended to bleach the enclosure and everything used to handle that butterfly to stop further contamination.

I use wipes daily on all sides of the enclosures where no cat is sitting and rotate in and out of newly bleached enclosures every couple of days.

There is a possibility of a butterfly having viable enough wings trying to make it to Mexico, and that could have a terrible effect on the population, because when they migrate they often cluster together (for warmth) in bushes and trees along the way and if an infested butterfly joins them (tho it may be to weak to make it the whole way) it could contaminate the others. They need to practice social distancing!


