February 27 ZOOM PROGRAM Native Plants and Composting Peggy Maslow & Claire Treves Brezel

Peggy will discuss the Native Plant Gardens Program including suggestions for replacing lawn and invasive plants in yards to help native wildlife survive and mitigate climate change.

Claire will discuss how you can start composting and the Community Compost at SMLI, launched in 2020, the area's only composting demonstration facility dedicated to reducing food waste and building healthy soils. The 20 participating families have rescued over 7.5 tons of kitchen scraps from landfills, returning it to the soil.

Claire runs the Community Compost, serves on the SMLI Advisory Board and was a co-founder of climate action group, Transition Town Port Washington. Her professional background is in corporate marketing and business development. Her passion is reduction and diversion of food waste and plastics. Her work has been featured in Newsday and the NYSAR3 Conference

Peggy Maslow is a past NSAS president, and current chair of the Education Committee, including BIrd-Friendly Habitat Certification. She has given several native plant presentations, including RewildLI and Planting Fields Arboretum. Using grants she has created ten native plant public gardens in Nassau County, and certified 75 yards.

• Purchasing various eggs so children can see and feel first hand what different bird species eggs look and feel like.

• Brochures and signs for This is a Certified Native Plant Garden.

• Placing benches, plaques or plants in memory of past dedicated NSAS Board members and placed

At this juncture I just want to add that every board member volunteers to do their job at no cost to the organization. We do these things because we love caring for the birds, environment and educating others.



Bird-Friendly Habitat Certification

Please consider contacting NSAS at nsaudubonsociety@gmail.com for advice on how to help birds in your yard. If your yard qualifies you get a sign that says Bird-Friendly Habitat Certification. But if you don't earn the sign at first NSAS keeps helping you until your yard gualifies, which involves having a yard with native plants and few invasive non-natives and less lawn.

You also get points for composting, using a rain barrel, having a water source for birds and using natural mulch. So please email us to set up an appointment for us to visit your yard during Spring/Summer. We help you choose native plants and design your yard as well. In the past 6 years we have visited and helped over 100 gardens to become bird-friendly habitats.

Owl Viewing Protocol

One of the more difficult to find species on Long Island, or really most places, are Owls. Because of their nocturnal habits and our inability to see well in the dark, most of us only get to hear a muffled call on occasion

There are several species that live on Long Island year-round and we frequently have northern visitors during the winter months. With resident owls calling and looking for mates and arriving northern visitors, Owl viewing protocols are important.

Most important is not to disturb or come close. That means stay as far away as possible, be quiet and leave once you have taken a look - and NO getting up close to take a cell phone photo, just enjoy the moment instead. Because they are an exciting bird to see, many birding groups ban listing of locations to prevent birds from being harassed because of past bad behavior on the part of members of the public and overzealous photographers. If you do see an owl, enjoy the moment and leave it in peace. Please don't publicize the location outiside of other trusted friends and birders. Every time a bird is disturbed, whether it is resting or hunting, it lowers its survival by a little bit and those small insults can accumulate. Don't love them to death.

National Audubon at COP28

As the leading bird conservation organization in the Americas, the National Audubon Society will join world leaders at the 2023 UN Climate Change Conference (COP28) November 30- December 12, to call for a focus on nature-based climate solutions that address the dual crises of climate change and biodiversity loss. Audubon's COP28 delegation will include CEO Elizabeth Gray, Vice President Of Climate Sarah Rose, Colombia Country Director for Audubon Americas Camilo Cardozo, and Chief Strategy Integration Officer Allison Vogt.

Global policymakers at COP15 in Montreal pledged to protect biodiversity and conserve 30 percent of land, water, and seas by 2030, and COP28 presents the opportunity to do more to halt and reverse nature loss. As Audubon scientists found in a 2021 study, critical bird habitats often overlap with key ecosystems that also serve as natural carbon sinks and habitats for many species. Strategically restoring and maintaining priority landscapes like wetlands, forests, and grasslands will provide safe havens for birds and other wildlife while also helping to mitigate the effects of climate change.

To raise awareness about the effectiveness of nature-based solutions, Audubon will host a panel at the Nature Positive Pavilion.
